

Successful students...


- Attend class and study

Academic Advisers vs. International Student Advisers

Academic Advisors...

know the details of a student's academic plan and major requirements. They help with all academic issues. Academic advisors are located in a college or department.

International Advisors...

know the details of a student's F1 or J1 student visa and advise on immigration issues and the rights and responsibilities of that visa. International advisors are located in Berkeley International Office (BIO).

Many academic choices students make could have consequences for their immigration status, so they'll often need to see a BIO advisor after seeing an academic advisor.





FERPA: Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act


Berkeley students have the right to...

- view their student records.
- keep personally identifiable information withheld from public view (unless they consent to viewing by particular individuals).
- review who has been authorized to view their records.
- request corrections to their records.
- file complaints about FERPA violations.

COVID Testing Information

PCR (swab) COVID-19 testing at our Durant site is available for UCB students who meet the following categories:

- close contact with a confirmed case (less than 15 minutes, less than 6 feet apart, and only if between 3-10 days since exposure)
- program requirements, per prior agreement
- symptoms concerning for COVID-19

Testing is performed Monday - Friday from 10am-4pm on the Durant Avenue side of the Tang Center either as a walk-up or drive-through. All testing and swabbing must be ordered in advance. Test results are typically known in 2-3 business, although on occasion it may take longer.



Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS)

- Brief therapy
- Referrals to the community therapists for long-term counseling, evaluation and medication
- Crisis counseling
- Groups sessions
 - Structured skill building groups (health and wellness, social skills, procrastination)
 - Support groups (grief and loss, transitions, graduate students, students of color)
 - General therapy groups
- Phone consultation
- Career exploration and career library
- Let's Talk informal one-time, drop-in consultation for students who are not ready to start counseling



If you are outside of US...

- Currently CAPS counselors are not able to provide counseling to individuals outside of US due to licensure restriction
- International students are welcome to contact CAPS for consultation
- CAPS counselors can work with you and identify your local resources

Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP)

All Cal students must have health insurance. Most students purchase the Student Health Insurance Plan (SHIP).

SHIP uses these health insurance companies:

- VSP eye health
- MetLife dental health

SHIP Waiver

- International students studying in their home country were eligible to apply for a waiver of SHIP insurance if they had national healthcare
- Deadline has passed (July 31)

Getting Medical Attention

It's extremely urgent.

EMERGENCY

For immediate help with life or death situations It's urgent.

URGENT CARE / DROP-IN CLINIC

For same-day help with colds, flus, bones, nausea, etc.

PRIMARY CARE

It's not urgent.

For check ups, longterm issues, physical therapy, counseling, etc.



Don't Lose Money!

For non-emergencies, go to the Tang Center first.

If doctors think students need further treatment from a specialist outside of the Tang Center, they will give write an authorization or referral to that specialist.

Can students go directly to a specialist without going to the Tang Center first?

Yes, but they will probably have to pay full price. SHIP will probably not cover these visits.




Center for Support and Intervention

Goal: To prevent violence and harm in the UC Berkeley community

CSI is...

- a central point for campus faculty and staff to report concerns about student safety
- a case management group that speaks with troubled students and connects them to the appropriate services on campus





Recognize Identity Theft, Phishing & Scams

- Define terms: Identity theft, phishing, scam
- What do identity thieves look for?
 - Personal information and passwords
 - Social security numbers and bank account information
- Phishing emails and texts often...
 - claim to have noticed unusual activity in your bank account or immigration record.
 - ask you to confirm personal information, download software or make a payment.
 - offer money discounts, refunds, and coupons.
- Scammers and identity thieves often...
 - claim to represent government agencies, banks, credit card companies, insurance agents.
 - make unexpected, urgent demands for information or payment.
 - threaten severe, immediate consequences.



Avoid Scams & Identity Theft

- Keep your computer anti-virus software up to date.
- Do NOT log into sensitive websites via a public Wi-Fi connections. (For example, do not check your bank account at a café or at the library.)
- If someone calls you, do NOT offer or confirm any information about yourself. Try to get the phone number and name of the caller.
- Do NOT send payments in any form through a wire transfer, through cash or through gift cards.
- Notify banks, Berkeley International Office and police as necessary.

Safety in Berkeley and the Bay Area

- Lock doors and windows.
- Do not leave valuables visible in cars or in public places such as restaurants or libraries.
- Stay aware at ATMs. Do not count money in public.
- Do not routinely carry immigration documents. Leave passports, I-20s, DS-2019s and SSN cards at home in a secure spot.
- Hold electronics, wallets and purses tightly, especially on public transit.
- Be aware of your surroundings, especially at night and especially when using electronics. Walk in groups or use a UC Berkeley night service to get home safely.
- Use a high-quality U-lock and cable on your bike.

During non-required terms of study, Study = optional (FT, PT or not at all) Employment = optional (FT, PT or not at all)






